- Most headlines regarding Mexico have something to do with the Cartel war
- Between 125,000-150,000 homicides were related to organized crime
- Cartels receive between 19-29 billion dollars a year from the United States
- To put an end to cartel violence it is crucial to understand they are different than their media portrayals.



The shared responsibility

- Most of the cartel business comes from the United States
- The creation of the Merida Initiative in 2008
- American tourists demand for drugs beginning to effect Mexico's economy



Tourists effect on Cartels

- Mexico has over 20 million tourists visiting every year
- Cartels understand that hurting tourism will hurt the countries economy, so they act accordingly
- In 2021 a shootout between two rival cartels happened in a Hyatt Ziva in Puerto Morelos
- More recently there has been more violence spilling into tourist areas beginning to hurt Mexico's GDP



Media coverage and its effects

- Many tv series and movies have been made about cartels some notable ones being Narcos Mexico and Sicario
- Cartels are frequently depicted as violent organizations made up of uneducated men
- The Mexican army views Narcos with a very different uniform than theirs
- By emphasizing such a difference between the two the government can send many young men to their deaths




The extent of the Cartels influence

- Cartels have such a strong influence that in certain communities they are seen as the figures of authority
- El Señor de Los Cielos had connections as high as the head of Mexico's anti drug agency
- With so much corruption it makes it difficult for the Mexican people to pick a side in the ongoing war between cartels and the government



Mexico's fight against corruption

- With the amount of corruption in the Mexican government it is incredibly difficult for politicians to fight it
- The Michoacanazo was a landmark trial in Mexico's history in fighting corruption
- President Felipe Calderón's efforts to fight corruption in Mexico



Are Mexican Cartels helpful to Mexico?

- "Mexico probably made more money in 2009 moving drugs than it did exporting oil..."
- Cartel cash propped up Mexican banks saving them from a financial crisis
- Cartels launder their money through legitimate businesses providing many a livable wage
- The Sinaloa cartel gave out care packages during the start of the Covid-19 outbreak in Mexico
